The Kent Test

- You must register your child if you would like them to sit the Kent test
- Register online at <u>www.kent.gov.uk/ola</u>
- Any difficulties registering, ring secondary admissions 03000 41 21 21
- Register between 1 June and 3 July 2023

THE KENT TEST

- English & Maths Test (60 minutes)
- Reasoning Test includes verbal, non-verbal and spatial (60 minutes)
- Writing (40 minutes)*

UNDERSTANDING THE TEST

- On KCC website Click on School Places, go to The Kent Test, click on Test paper. There is a familiarisation booklet to show you the type of questions in each section

- Coaching pupils in school is not permitted. 'If we receive evidence that a school is coaching we reserve the right to 'unlink' it from PESE.'
 (PESE = Procedure for Entrance to Secondary Education)

WHAT DOES THE KENT TEST LOOK LIKE?

- The test format and style of questions changes every year but children would benefit from some familiarisation either through practice books or online resources such as BOFA11+.com and Bond Online
- GL Assessment 11+ booklets are available (also Bond, CGP)
- Test books are available for all areas of the test including spatial

WHAT TO EXPECT IN THE KENT TEST

This is an example of what the Kent Test looks like but the format could change slightly.

ENGLISH READING (TEXT FOLLOWED BY MULTIPLE CHOICE QUESTIONS) CHILDREN NEED A WIDE VOCABULARY AND TO BE ABLE TO READ AT SPEED

6 QUESTIONS PUNCTUATION

6 QUESTIONS SPELLING

MATHS E.G. 2 STEP PROBLEMS TIME, MONEY, NUMBER SEQUENCES, FRACTIONS, MEASURE, GRAPHS, %, SHAPE **(SIMILAR TO WORK COMPLETED IN** SCHOOL]

VERBAL REASONING E.G. ALPHABET CODE, FINDING WORDS WITHIN WORDS, ANTONYMS (OPPOSITES)

NON-VERBAL 3 SECTIONS 5 MINS FOR 10 QUESTIONS Spatial 2 Sections 4 Mins For 9 Questions

WRITING – 40 MINS - IN AFTERNOON

CHOICE OF DIFFERENT TITLES BOTH FICTION AND NON-FICTION

What happens after the test?

- Test scores back to school
- If a pupil, who we feel is of grammar school ability, underperforms in test we will prepare for Headteacher Appeals
- Headteacher appeals writing completed in Kent test is looked at along with children's books
- Results by email October 18th
- Complete SCAF by October 31st

CAT4 TESTS AND WHAT THEY MEAN

- 4 sections to the test
- 1 = Verbal (words), 2 = Quantitative (numbers), 3 = Non-verbal (shapes) & 4 = spatial (shape & space)
- Spatial is also in the Kent test
- Each section is scored 100 is average
- 112 is above average (114+ = top 20%)



- 4 preferences (A child who gets a grammar school assessment is not guaranteed a grammar school place. Schools set their own oversubscription criteria – look at school websites.)
- Check you have completed any supplementary forms for the school (e.g. St Anselm's) or banding assessment (Canterbury Academy). Information will be on the school's website.
- Better to use all the preferences as naming fewer than 4 schools will not improve a child's eligibility for admission to any of them. You may be offered a school by default.
- National Offer Day is March 1st
- Instructions on how to appeal is sent out with letter of offer.
